

MAGDALENE LAUNDRIES



Magdalene Asylums were institutions operated by the Roman Catholic church all over the world for over 150 years. They were institutions for so-called “fallen women”. These fallen women were usually girls who had got pregnant before marriage, or they were girls accused of being sexually active, developmentally handicapped, mentally disabled, outspoken, strong willed, or otherwise non-conforming. These inmates were required to undertake hard physical labor such as laundry work. They were common in Ireland, Canada, Australia, United States, Britain, New Zealand, and many other countries until about 1996. These slave labor camps for strong willed women were occupied by an estimated 30,000 women over the years. These woman were abused in every human way known to man, including sexually and mentally. The young girls were often used by Catholic priests for their sexual pleasure. All these girls were held against their will and forced to work without any compensation.
