STATUES...HALO...HORSESHOES...CANDLES

St. Peter's Basilica has hundreds of statues above, around, and inside it.




The large bronze statue of St. Peter that stands near the high altar of St. Peters Cathedral in the Vatican, is nothing more than a duplicate of the statue of Jupiter. This is the statue that millions of people, including the Popes, bow down to and kiss the feet of to this very day. The very idea that a Born Again Believer would bow down to and give reverence to a statue is scary. In Elijah's days the Baal worshippers bowed to their heathen statues and kissed them. Kissing statues is a pagan practice and is clearly forbidden as per the second commandment. (1Kgs. 9:15-17, Hosea 13:1-3)





The statue of St. Peter has been rubbed and kissed so many times, the bronze is wearing off. This gives you an idea of just how many Roman Catholic idol worshippers have passed through Satan's Basilica over the years giving honor to statues and idols.





There is a statue of Moses in St. Peters Basilica, the supposed great Roman Catholic church of Rome that has horns on it. Can you even imagine the audacity, the abomination. How is it possible for any Roman Catholic person with half a brain to accept this kind of demonic idolatry right in their supposed Mother Church? Imagine how hard it must be for a follower of Rome to see this and continue to follow such a pagan religion.

Throughout the world you will find supposed statues and pictures of angels, and people naked, or almost, in Cathedrals and churches. THE "HALO"



The "halo" drawn above the head of statues and paintings of Messiah, Angels, various saints (biblical characters), and the Virgin Mary in many so-called Christian pictures, is an occult symbol. The same halo type image was used in Babylonian times and called the "Babylonian Solar Wheel". Semiramis used the symbol of the moon to represent her; when put together with pictures and etchings as a background, it became the halo. The Halo, simply symbolizes the sun god, the moon god, or Semiramis the Queen of heaven, whichever one feels more comfortable worshipping.

This same pagan symbol is still used today in association with Hindu and Buddhist statues and pictures. The Roman Catholic church in fact, borrowed this pagan symbol from the heathen customs of centuries past. Then, because the Roman Catholics used it, the Protestant churches added it to their inventory of heathen symbols and practices.







THE HORSE SHOE

In days of old it was common practice to see a horseshoe hanging above doors in the christian churches. The horse shoe was considered a good luck charm for pagans. They were commonly found attached above doors in christian churches many years ago and can still be seen in many today. The idea came from the halo.





CANDLES

Years ago people would "Tie a yellow ribbon round on oak tree," to pray to the Sun god to spare their children from the Druid bone-fires. During the bone fires, the fat from children was saved and melted down with a wick in the middle. These victims were called "Jack-of-the-lantern. **This is the origin of the candle.** This candle would be put inside a jack-o-lantern to ward off the evil spirits.

The candles used in serious occult sacrifices for many years now have been made of a wax mixture which included exactly 44% bee's wax. The candles used in many churches today (mostly Roman Catholic), are the same types of candles used in pagan rituals in days of old. These special candles are all made with precisely 44% bees wax, exactly the way the heathen rituals required. Why aren't they 30, 50 or 60%, why exactly 44%.

In many Roman Catholic churches candles are burned in devotion to ancestral spirits of the dead. Many Catholics pray to and for their dead loved ones. They light candles in the so-called sanctuary, to honor the dead.
