



Over 535 stone labyrinths have been documented, mainly from Sweden, Finland and Norway. At least 20 may have existed before 1100 AD.



Mala — a string of beads used in reciting a mantra. The mantra phrase or "prayer" is repeated for each bead.

ROSARY

The Rosary is another symbol of paganism of old, adapted into the Roman Catholic church. The Rosary is a chain with 15 sets of small beads, each set marked off by one large bead, joined by a medal bearing with the imprint of Mary on it. From this hangs a short chain with a crucifix on it.

As stated by the Roman Catholic church, the five mysteries of the rosary are; in order of importance: the eucharist, the Bible, the sacrament of reconciliation, the rosary, personal sacrifice, and fasting. In the prayers of the rosary, it is MARY who is prayed to, not Yeshua. In one of the prayers in regards to "An act of consecration to the Immaculate heart of Mary," the following excerpt is found. *"O Virgin of Fatima, Mother of Mercy, Queen of Heaven and earth, Refuge of sinners, we now consecrate ourselves to your Immaculate Heart."* (see Jer. 7:18, 44:17/25)

Other samples of relentless repetition of prayers often spoken with rosary are as follows:

"By your immaculate heart, O Mary, grant me strength in my ordeals, because Jesus wants to associate me with the redemption, through my sufferings"

"By your immaculate heart, O Mary, give me your burning love so that I can accept the crosses the Father has given me"

"By your immaculate heart, O Mary. give me the grace to understand that the love of God conquers all suffering and death"

As you can see, in all these useless prayers, the people are lead to think that they are unworthy, shameful, guilty, pions, as they supposedly pray. These prayers are repeated constantly. It is no wonder why so many innocent victims of this pagan religion feel so shameful and unworthy of a good life.

The Mohammedans use a similar set of beads that consist of either 33, 66 or 99 beads for counting the names of Allah. Marco Polo found the King of Malabar using a

rosary to count his prayers back in the 13th. century. Rosaries are commonly used by Buddhists of Japan, Tibet, and India. A circle of beads very similar were used in the worship of Astarte in 800 BC. and are shown on Phoenician coins of old. The Brahmans, worshippers of "Vishnu" also use similar chains containing 108 beads. The Siva worshipper uses a rosary to keep track of the 1008 names of his god as he recites them.
